SHOUTOUTS

- Completed his four-year career at Bowling Green with 125 catches for 1,529 yards and 13 touchdowns.
- Named first-team All-MAC in 2020 with 20 receptions for 248 yards in 5 games.
- Grabbed 4 passes for 61 yards vs. Buffalo (11/17/20).
- Was a second-team All-MAC selection in 2019, leading the team with 55 receptions, 649 yards, and 4 TDs. His reception total was the most by a MAC tight end that year.
- Registered career highs in receptions (9) and yards (92) at Notre Dame (10/5/19).
- Hauled in a career-long 59-yard reception vs. Louisiana Tech (9/14/19) as part of a 6-90 receiving performance.
- Finished 2nd on the team with 42 catches and 516 yards in 2018.
- Posted season highs of 8 catches for 93 yards and 2 touchdowns vs. Eastern Kentucky (9/15/18).
- Saw action in 11 games as a freshman in 2017 and grabbed 8 passes for 116 yards and his first two collegiate touchdowns.
- Registered a 29-yard TD catch at Buffalo (11/7/17).

QUINTIN MORRIS was signed by the Bills as an undrafted free agent following the 2021 draft. A former wide receiver turned tight end, he finished his four-year college career at Bowling Green with 125 catches for 1,529 yards.

BEST DECISION

Bowling Green coach Scot Loeffler told the Toledo Blade regarding his move to tight end: "He always did things the right way. When he got moved over from wide receiver to tight end, he embraced it. That probably was the best decision he ever made. He's also a good student."

BASKETBALL BACKGROUND

A two-sport athlete growing up in Richmond, TX, Morris credits his basketball skills with helping him on the football field. Morris told the USA Today, "It definitely helps a lot. I played basketball since first grade, almost the same time I started playing football at a young age. I feel like basketball teaches you a lot of movements with your body that otherwise you probably wouldn't get, just playing football. Just being able to play basketball for a majority of my life allows me to move and jump, and you use some of those techniques, especially when you're going up for a ball, whether it's boxing out and understanding depth perception. Going up for a ball is almost like rebounding. It really helps, and I think that's why you think of a lot of good tight ends these days, they almost all have a basketball background, and it helps them with their footwork and attacking the ball."
